Key Vocabulary

Arctic	Area of frozen sea and land around the North Pole.
Antarctica	A continent. The South Pole is located here.
climate	Climate is a long-term pattern of the weather conditions.
colour mixing	Mixing colours together to create different colours.
equator	An imaginary circle around the Earth which divides the northern hemi- sphere and southern hemi- sphere.
hemisphere	A hemisphere is formed by dividing the earth into the Northern and Southern Hemispheres at the equator.
North Pole and South Pole	The North Pole is at the northernmost point of the Earth, while the South Pole is at the southernmost point on the Earth.
primary colours	One of the three colours, red, yellow and blue, that can be mixed together in different ways to make any other colour.
secondary colours	A colour resulting from the mixing of two primary colours.

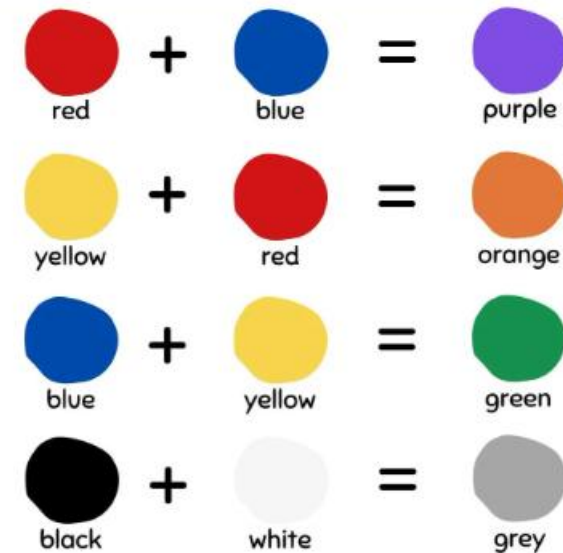
Colour Mixing

COLOR MIXING CHART

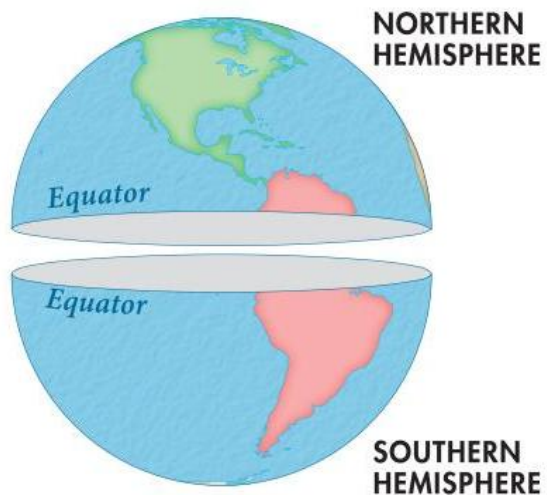
PRIMARY COLORS

The Equator



- The equator is an imaginary line that divides the world in half.
- The equator is an equal distance between the North and South Poles.
- The weather on the equator is hot all year round.
- At the equator, day and night are both 12 hours long.

Locational Language

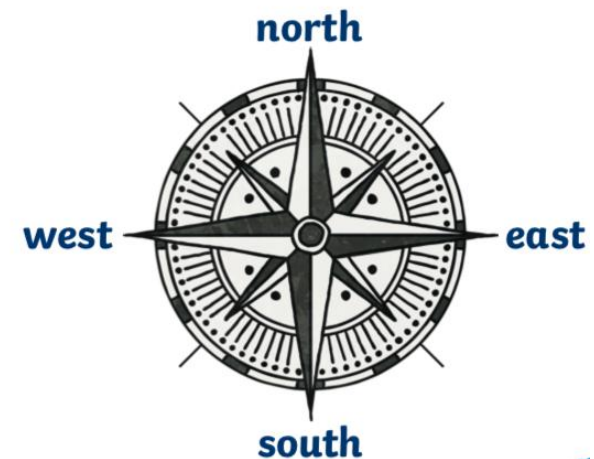
- Compasses are used to help people find their way or to show the position of something.

Fact File: Antarctica
