


## Parent Survey: Response Distribution by Question



**Q1:** Behaviour in school is good

**Q2:** Behaviour is consistently well managed by staff

**Q3:** My child is not bullied at school

**Q4:** Bullying and discrimination is dealt with quickly

**Q5:** My child is keen to learn

**Q6:** The school has clear routines and expectations

**Q7:** The policy is used fairly

**Q8:** Support for emotionally triggered behaviour

**Q9:** My child is encouraged to have good attendance

**Q10:** School has a positive, respectful culture

**Q11:** My child understands how behaviour supports learning

# Behaviour and Attitudes Questionnaire Analysis

Based on the 62 parent responses in the survey data, here's an analysis of the key findings:

## Key Strengths

1. **Attendance Encouragement** - Approximately 85% of parents agree their child is encouraged to have good attendance and punctuality.
2. **Learning Eagerness** - Around 80% of parents agree their child is keen to learn.
3. **Clear Behavior Expectations** - About 75% of parents agree the school has clear routines and expectations for behavior.

## Areas for Improvement

1. **Bullying Management** - Around 12% of parents disagree that bullying is dealt with quickly and effectively, with a high percentage (38%) remaining neutral, suggesting uncertainty about the school's approach. This may be because they have had no personal experience.
2. **Staff Behavior Management** - About 15% of parents disagree that behavior is consistently well managed by staff.
3. **Policy Awareness** - Approximately 30% of parents have not read the school's Positive Behavior and Relationships policy. This should be emailed at the start of each academic year moving forward.

## Additional Insights

- There's a notable gap between general perceptions of good behavior in school (70% agree) and confidence in how staff manage behavior (60% agree).
- Parents who report their children have emotionally triggered behavior show lower satisfaction with support measures.
- The survey shows most parents agree their child understands how good behavior supports learning, which is a positive foundation.

## Recommendations

1. Improve communication about how bullying incidents are handled and resolved by sharing the policy with parents.
2. Use the National College staff training for consistent approaches to behavior management
3. Highlight the behaviour policy in the next newsletter to increase parent engagement with it
4. Build on strengths in encouraging attendance and fostering a positive learning environment
5. Continue to offer targeted support for families with children who have emotionally triggered behaviour

The data shows a generally positive perception of the school's behavioral climate, with some specific areas that could benefit from focused improvement initiatives.
