

Hadrian's Wall (The UK)





- Hadrian's Wall in Northern
 England was built to mark out the
 boundaries of the Roman Empire
 and to keep the Scots out.
- It was built in 122AD.
- The wall is 120 km long, (73 Miles)
- It took at least 6 years to build.

The Great Wall of China



- The Great Wall of China is in the north of China. It was built to protect China from enemies in the north.
- They began building it in 220 BC.



- The wall is 21,196 km long.
- It is the longest structure ever made and can be seen from space.

Chinese New Year



Chinese New Year celebrates the start of a new year on the Chinese calendar. Traditionally, celebrations last 15 days. The Chinese calendar is made up of 12 years each cycle. Each year is named after an animal. In 2023 it will be the Year of the Rabbit.

Chinese New Year Traditions

- Before the New Year, Chinese people clean their houses to sweep away any
 bad luck.
- Houses are decorated with good luck phrases such as "Happiness".
- · Children receive red envelopes filled with money as gifts.
- Lion and dragon dances are common.
- Fireworks are used to scare away bad spirits.
- Celebrations are ended with a lantern festival.
